FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

Our nation has moved to the other side of the tragedy of the pandemic and we are trying to get back to a more normal LIFE, but there are still lingering effects from the virus. Football may have returned to normalcy but our spiritual institutions are still suffering from long Covid. We have not returned to full participation in person and or virtual due to after-effects from isolation and many who have dropped out of church and school have not returned. Huntsville Bible College, like most small private schools, has seen a drop in enrollment during the pandemic, but through it all God has sustained us. The good news is despite a drop in enrollment HBC had its largest number of graduates, 28, in 2022. Included in that number were 9 Doctor of Ministry students, praise God.

ABHE Accreditation:

Huntsville Bible College hosted a self-study team visit in March 2021 and in February 2022, received its accreditation reaffirmation for the next 10 years. Thanks to each of you who played a part in the self-study as well as those for any follow-up information that was provided. HBC had several issues that must be addressed in the annual report for November 2023.

Fundraising Efforts:

The 2022 Vision Banquet was held in person at the VBC with a limited audience of about 350 in attendance. This year HBC honored leaders in the church and the community who contribute to the well-being of the church and impact our community and ministry.

The 2022 Golf Tournament was a great success despite failing greens and was held at the Colonial Golf Course, with 65 players.

The Endowment Campaign for 2021 was a huge success and we are looking forward to the 2022 Campaign which begins November 1, 2022 through December 15, 2022.

The Laughing All the Way fundraiser will be in person for the first time in three years, and we are anticipating a joyful time at the Jaycee's building.

Leadership and Staff Support:

I want to thank the faithful staff at HBC for your willingness to be team players, as you did your work you also shared in volunteerism by working on fundraising events and giving sacrificially to support the college. HBC is blessed to have a diverse and supportive Board of Directors, who have faithfully supported the college.

Signing Off:

As a preacher of the Word, I have had the joy of preaching the Word for the almost last 57 years. There were many times I had to say "let me close " before the end, but this is it. I had the joy and sorrows of leading this college since its birth in 1986, but it is time to close. Equipping Saints to Serve in the Church and the Community

Staff and Leadership Transition:

The Huntsville Bible College is currently working on a plan to select a new president and secure the leadership transition by March 2023. Leadership training and development have been enhanced by cross-training the current employees to provide support during the transition process. HBC continues in its staffing and leadership transition as new employees are hired, responsibilities are shifted and employees retiring.

Improving Advancement/Development:

One of the priorities in the path forward is to continue to improve the image and reach of the college into the community locally as well as virtually. The goal is to highlight the academic success of HBC, particularly the undergraduate programs in Pastoral Ministry and Christian Education, and the graduate program in Ministry. Evaluation is being made of current programs for improvement and modifications. HBC will be submitting a substantive change to ABHE to request permission to offer all of its programs on line or in person. HBC will be exploring some grant funding to support the accreditation of the social work program. HBC continues to involve the alumni in building a stronger partnership for future support.

Increase Enrollment:

The key to the stability of an institution is a strong enrollment. HBC is working on refining and improving the following to facilitate enrollment growth:

- Refocusing of Public Relations images and recruiting tools, to include social media and direct mail
- Continue website enhancement and expand prospect data base
- Increase the percentage of on-line classes per program to 100 percent, if needed
- Streamlining of Graduate and Postgraduate Programs for more efficiency
- Review and rebuilding of Certificate Programs
- Promotion of College Credit for Prior Learning
- Addition of a Master's Certificate Program

Financial Stability:

Financial priorities include:

- Endowment Expansion through prudent investment management strategies
- Enhancement and growth of the Scholarship Fund through fundraising initiatives
- Identification of new sources of revenue and grants and expand donor base and improve data bases

FROM THE OFFICE OF THE ACADEMIC DEAN

When I started teaching at HBC (Spring Semester 2013), the close, caring atmosphere of the administration, faculty, and students taught me what it meant for teaching to be a ministry and not just a job. Over the years, the HBC 'family' has shown me what a blessing and an asset this is for us. I am excited by the opportunity to serve with the staff of the college and pray that I will serve well.

In May, we celebrated the completion of 13 undergraduate certificates and degrees, and 15 graduate degrees, including our first cohort of Doctors of Ministry. Our post-graduate faculty, Dean Walker, and especially the students themselves all worked hard to make sure this happened. Congratulations to all of you.

Our enrollment has been down this year. Most colleges are seeing a drop-in enrollment, but HBC is not most colleges, and we do not expect this trend to continue. While we are making necessary cost -saving changes, we are also increasing our online course offerings and working on exciting new

certificate programs to increase enrollment. Two of these certificate programs, a Bachelor's Certificate in Church Ministry and one graduate-level certificate, are on track to be offered for Spring 2023, with more coming in Fall 2023.

In December, HBC plans to submit a Substantive Change Request to ABHE for accreditation to offer our programs entirely online as well as on campus. We have 20 students enrolled in our 'online' campus this semester and demand is growing. Allowing students to complete their degrees completely online will open opportunities for recruiting out-of-town students and faculty as well as providing better access for our local students.

While the present is not all rosy, we have reason to remain hopeful. Reminders that this is a ministry and not just a job keeps us working hard to serve our current students while finding new students and new ways to serve.

FROM THE DEAN OF GRADUATE STUDIES

The Master of Ministry in Pastoral Studies (MMPS) is now structured as a cohort graduate degree program, and presently has 8 active students. HBC's graduate program will offer a **Master's Certificate Program (MCP)** with each respective Certificate Program being a 12 Credit Hour program, with each including four (4) 3 Credit Hour courses meeting one night per week for 2.5 hours for 16 weeks during the designated semester:

Master's Certificate in Pastoral Studies (MCPS): 12 Credit Hrs. beginning in Spring 2023

Master's Certificate in Christian Counseling (MCCC): 12 Credit Hrs. beginning in Fall 2023

Master's Certificate in Church Management (MCCM):12 Credit Hrs. beginning in Fall 2023

The Doctor of Ministry in Biblical Leadership (DMBL) degree program:

Cohort 1's nine (9) students graduated in May 2022.

Cohort 2 has two (2) actively enrolled students, who are tracking for graduation in May 2023.

Cohort 3 has six (6) actively enrolled students and are tracking toward a May 2024 graduation date.

Cohort 4 (which began this 2022 Fall Semester) has eight (8) actively enrolled students.

Cohort 5 is projected to begin in the 2023 Fall Semester having: one student already accepted, one has begun, and one confirmed to begin.

The Graduate and Post Graduate Faculty Advisory Committee (GPFAC) is in the process of reviewing to update our <u>DMIN Policy</u>, <u>Procedures</u>, and <u>Timeline Handbook</u> as well as our <u>Graduate & Postgraduate STEP Brochure</u>.

The HBC Faculty faithfully, generously, joyfully, and sacrificially fulfill various responsibilities as active members of our HBC college community.



TWO OPTIONS FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Option One

Scholarship Endowment

This option has no connection to the HBC Endowment Fund but will require a substantial donation to assure that funds are available each year.

- •A one-time donation of \$5,000 would endow a scholarship of \$500 to a student annually (\$300 from the sponsor and \$200 supplemented by the College).
- •A one-time donation of \$10,000 would endow a scholarship of \$1,000 to a student annually (\$600 from the sponsor and \$400 supplemented by the College).
- •A one-time donation of \$20,000 would endow a scholarship of \$2,000 to a student annually (\$1200 from the sponsor and \$800 supplemented by the College).

Option Two

Annual Payments

This option allows the sponsoring organization or individual donor to commit to a specified gift amount (minimum of \$500) in honor of the named individual or entity. Funds must be submitted on or before July 1st of each year to ensure the availability of funds before school begins.


